



Lake Gogebic was a favorite place in the summer. The County Park was maintained and its swimming beach was watched over by lifeguards. It was then, and still is, a favorite fishing spot for bass.



The Gogebic Hotel and Cottages, on the south end of the lake, was a favorite spot for wealthy tourists coming from Milwaukee, Chicago, Detroit, Minneapolis and St. Louis, to visit, play, fish and relax. The MLS&W Railroad Company advertised the opening of the Gogebic Resort in 1889. It offered "Every convenience for the comfort and pleasure of guests. A fine fleet of pleasure and fishing boats of all descriptions, sail boats, and a steam yacht at the service of guests". Rates were \$2.50 per day or \$14.00 per week.

In the early 1920s, there were hundreds of baseball teams on The Range. The Oliver Mining Company had a baseball league with seven teams: the Kilowatts, Office, Underground, Laboratory, Surface, Machinests and Carpenters. Each town had a team: Wakefield, Ironwood, Hurley and Bessemer. Newport and Oliver, the Jackson Sluggers, Jessieville are others. Jessieville had the battery of Mullen, Basso and McManman while Kolinen, George, Johnson played for the Sluggers.
